


At the 2025 IIAS-DARPG Conference held on 11th February in New Delhi, India Professor Kayuni delivered a paper titled "Aligning Ubuntu Philosophy with Public Sector Reforms in the Age of Digital Transformation: A Case Study of Malawi." The presentation explored how ubuntu — an African philosophy rooted human dignity, in community, and shared purpose — could enrich public

— to effectively respond to these changes. He positioned Malawi at a critical crossroads where global shifts can either accelerate or stall progress, urging policy actors to be both adaptive and forward-looking.

The paper highlighted critical role of traditional leaders in governance, conflict development, and resolution. It proposed research-informed training curriculum that equips traditional leaders with competencies in governance, legal frameworks, and

During a high-level symposium commemorating 140 years since the Berlin Conference, held on 30th January 2025 in Berlin, Professor Kayuni presented a

Security in The presentation critically examined nationalism, colonial-era borders, and politicised religious affiliations continue to challenge the ideals of Pan-African unity. He called for a reimagining of Pan-Africanism that embraces pluralism collective responsibility in the quest for peace and sustainable security on the continent.



UNIMA Law Students Win Global Lex: Lead Essay Competition

Lex: Lead(Lawyers for Economic Advancement and Development) Essay Competition is a global contest hosted annually Lex: lead, a group of international lawyers promoting economic development in the world's east developed countries. Established with support from the International Bar Association Foundation and working in partnership with the World Bank-supported Global Forum on Law, Justice and

Development, the competition invites students from eligible countries in Africa, Asia, and the Americas to submit essays on law and development topics for a onetime US\$500 award to each winner. The Lex: lead essay competition began in 2010 and has proceeded on an annual basis. In 2015. Lex:lead expanded program to offer mentorship and internship opportunities with the World Bank and NGOs for its

winners.

For the 2024 cycle, participants responded to the question: "How laws regulating climate change and the environment support economic development?" Three students from the University of Malawi's Departments of Law-Prince Mwai Kathewera (4th year), Victor M'gonjetsi Chimtolo (4th year), and Watipa Ellen Zimba (3rd year)—emerged among the 15 global winners. In his essay, Prince argued that overreliance on command-and-control regulations hampers development by imposing high compliance costs and discouraging innovation. He advocates a transition economic incentives, transparent information-sharing, and participatory governance promote sustainability alongside inclusive growth. Similarly, Victor robust emphasised that environmental catalyse laws development through sustainable resource use, green investment. and innovation. Refuting claims that such laws hinder growth, he supports policy coherence and stakeholder engagement.

In a complementary argument, Watipa critiqued fragmented legal approaches, asserting that isolated methods weaken enforcement and public trust. She proposes holistic, synergistic framework combining regulation, market tools, administrative oversight, and public participation to advance both environmental sustainability and inclusive economic progress.

Associate Professor Lewis Bande Publishes 2nd Edition of Book Criminal Law in Malawi

Associate Professor Lewis Chezani member of Bande. the Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education, authored the book Criminal Law in Malawi (Second Edition). book was published by Juta, a leading provider of legal, regulatory, business, and academic content across Africa in June 2025 and contains a foreward written by Justice Professor Radson Kapindu of the High Court of Malawi.

In 1072 pages, the book dissects and illuminates the substantive criminal law of Malawi. It builds on the first edition published in 2017 and incorporates legislative and case-law developments that have happened over the past seven years. The first part of the book

Criminal Law in Malawi (Second Edition) is intended to be a guide to both the theory and practice of criminal law in Malawi and other common law countries in the sub-Saharan region. It is an invaluable and essential resource for legal practitioners, judicial officers, law students and academics, criminal law enforcers. civil society practitioners, legislative and policy makers, and other interested academics and researchers.

Moot Trial Exercise for Fourth Year Law Students

The Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education recently held a remarkable Moot Trial Exercise on 16th April 2025, marking a high point in the Clinical Legal Education III module for fourth-year Bachelor of Laws (Hons) students. The moot, held before real Judges of the High Court in Blantyre, offered students a rare and invaluable opportunity to engage in simulated court proceedings under authentic courtroom conditions. The moot trial. capstone assessment contributing 40% of the students' final grade, is designed to simulate real-life litigation and to cultivate the advocacy, ethical conduct, and professional discipline required in legal practice. In the solemn environment of the High Court, students demonstrated remarkable legal acumen, composure, and mastery of procedure.

This year's exercise was particularly distinguished by the exceptional performances of several students, whose advocacy

Ms. Ruth Mchizi, a lecturer under the Department of Private Law, presented a paper which challenged the current framework child governing maintenance in Malawi, arguing that the laws are outdated and insufficiently enforced. She made a bold but thought-provoking link

between robust child maintenance enforcement and national economic planning. In her paper, Mtameni Lughano Kamuona, a 3rd year law student, highlighted the entrepreneurial of activities street-connected children in Zomba, such as shoe-shining, selling handmade crafts, music performance. She argued that these economic engagements, while born out of necessity, reflect untapped talent and resilience. Sungeni Mkwanda, a 3rd year law student, used her presentation to draw attention to how exploitative child labour often acts as both a cause and consequence of

children living on the streets. She explored how economic hardship forces families to push children into informal or illegal work often under hazardous conditions which can ultimately lead children to flee these environments. Lastly, the Child Rights Clinic itself presented a paper which examined growing prevalence of online child abuse such as cyberbullying and the distribution of child sexual exploitation materials (such as the Susu thing). case presenters criticised the current legislative framework for lacking clear provisions on digital forms of abuse and emphasised the

need for proactive cybercrime laws tailored to protect children in the digital age.

On May 16th, 2025, the University of Malawi held a landmark Men's Conference at the Chief Mwambo Lecture Theatre, organized by the LLB Class of 2025. The event was born out of a growing concern for the silent struggles male students face—particularly around mental health, stress, financial discipline, relationships, and life after college. While these challenges affect all students. recent trends have shown that male students are often less likely to seek help, yet more vulnerable to isolation, depression, or even suicide. This conference sought to address that gap by providing empowering, safe. and male- focused space for personal reflection, growth, and honest conversation.

Originally envisioned as a small

gathering for final-year male law students. the idea gained remarkable momentum and evolved into a full university-wide event, made possible through the support and endorsement of the Vice Chancellor, Professor Mkali Idruss Samson Sajidu. Though he could not attend in person, he delegated a representative and expressed his full support for the initiative.

The conference featured dynamic sessions led by respected speakers. Professor Garton Kamchedzera on building healthy spoke relationships and marriage, Chiwoza Bandawe Professor offered practical strategies for health and stress mental management, and Professor Edge Kanyongolo shared insightful guidance on career preparedness

and navigating life after college. Gift Whayo, founder of Zipatso Construction, inspired attendees with a talk on entrepreneurship and the value of self-reliance. The event was free and well-attended by students from across University of Malawi. It came at a timely moment when mental health issues on campus are a growing concern. The conference sparked meaningful dialogue and a shared desire for such targeted initiatives to become an annual tradition. It was not a space to exclude others, but rather a thoughtful response to the unique challenges young men face—and a call to take ownership of their personal journeys.

UNIMA Disability Rights Clinic Attends the International Albinism Awareness Day Commemorations



The UNIMA Disability Rights Clinic under the Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education was invited by the Association of Persons with Albinism in Malawi (APAM) to commemorate the International Albinism Awareness Day (IAAD) held on 17th June 2025, at Ntaja in Machinga District. The local theme of the year was "United for Peace and Inclusion: Strengthening the Protection of Persons with Albinism During All Times, Including Elections."

The Clinic, represented by the Patron, Dr Enoch Chilemba, the Clinic President Emeritus Jean Allih, the current Clinic President Albert Kuthemba-Mwale, Secretary Loveness Kumwenda and Clinician Patricia Liwonde.

set up a pavilion which was toured by the Minister of Defence Monica Chang'anamuno. The clinicians carried out a quick socio-legal survey with some of the people who attended. The participants included persons with albinism, community members and law enforcement. The respondents highlighted the essence of hosting the Machinga, commemoration in particularly due to the high prevalence abductions of persons with albinism in the past. The participants lamented that while persons with albinism continue to face stigma in some areas, they acknowledged huge shifts in the community's perception and treatment. The respondents described clear remedial frameworks for

reporting acts of discrimination and abuse, usually made to local chiefs and law enforcement. A attributed officer police provision of alarms to persons with albinism as an effective method for deterring potential The officer further attacks. reported that there had been no cases of abduction or murder in 2025, which is quite significant compared to the 2019 election year.

Through this event, the Clinic was able to reiterate its mission to promote, protect, and defend the rights of persons with albinism and provide them with legal information and resources for redress whenever they experience abuse or human rights violations.

Gender Justice Clinic Training (Advocating for Gender Equality and Social Justice)



On the 6th of March 2025, the Gender Justice Clinic at the University of Malawi (UNIMA) hosted a well-attended training session titled "Advocating for Equality and Social Gender Justice," facilitated by Dr. N. Mweso, the clinic's patron. The event brought together a diverse group of students from the Law other disciplines, aiming and deepen their to understanding of gender equality and social justice while equipping

them with practical advocacy skills.

Dr. N. Mweso emphasized key concepts such as the distinction and between gender sex. relevant intersectionality, and frameworks, legal including Malawi's Gender Equality Act and international conventions like CEDAW. Interactive sessions. including case studies, questions and answers session and a quiz allowed participants to apply

their knowledge in realistic training scenarios. The highly successful, with students gaining a stronger grasp of gender justice issues, improved advocacy techniques, valuable interdisciplinary connections. The Gender Justice Clinic plans to build on this momentum with further workshops and community outreach initiatives to foster lasting change in the fight for gender equality and social justice.

Public Lecture by Honourable Justice Fiona Mwale

On 14 March 2025, a public lecturer by Honourable Justice Fiona Mwale was held in the Wadonda Lecture Theatre in the Economics Department Building. This public lecture was designed to deepen understanding of the

judiciary's role in advancing the rights of children, with the aim of empowering current and future legal professionals to become more effective advocates for child protection within Malawi's justice system. The event drew participation from across disciplines students -(both secondary and tertiary), lawyers, magistrates, policymakers, and NGO representatives demonstrating growing interest in

justice-sector reforms that prioritise the rights and dignity of children. Q&A session followed, allowing participants to engage directly with the Honourable Justice on pressing challenges on child rights.

Justice Mwale began by reaffirming the foundational principles of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child of nondiscrimination, best interests of Volume 4 Issue 1







child, right to life and development, and the right of the child to be heard. She reflected on how these principles are and some not currently being integrated into judicial decision-making in Malawi. She acknowledged notable progress but pointed out persistent gaps for instance. children often lack legal representation; proceedings are not child-friendly; and many magistrates and court staff lack

adequate training in children's cases. Justice Mwale underscored the need procedural reforms, including the child-sensitive expedited hearings in involving children, mechanisms to ensure children's include voices are meaningfully heard in meaningfully, and urgently. proceedings that affect them. She concluded by challenging audience particularly students and young lawyers to see themselves

Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education Hosts the African Law Seminar

On the 28th and 29th of April, 2025, the Department of Public and Law Clinical Legal Education hosted the Institution for a virtual seminar organised the African by Institute of International Law (AIIL) under the theme "Educate an African Fit to Practice Law in the 21st Century." The twopart sessions were designed to equip students with knowledge on increasingly important areas of African law. The seminars were facilitated by the former UN Officer of Legal Affairs, Virginia Morris and led by two guest speakers: Judge Abdulqai A. Yusuf of the International Court of Justice as well as Professor Hajer Gueldich who served as Legal Counsel of the African Union. Law students and staff from the University of Malawi as well as various

African universities took part in the seminar.

Yusuf facilitated Judge an insightful discussion on the impact of Pan-Africanism public law in African states and nations, referencing his time as a judge at the ICJ. The session centred on critiquing the nature Eurocentric of international law and paved the way for thoughtful discourse on an international legal order that included as opposed to isolated African states. Professor Hajer led an equally engaging session that introduced the audience to the structure, operation and role ofAfrican the Union. Throughout her session, she drew from her experience as AU Legal Counsel as well as a law professor with a specialty in international law.

Her session focused on the evolution of the African Union and traced its mandate to foster integration, regional good governance and development. She also used the opportunity to highlight the need reforms institutional that accelerate the effectiveness of the AU both in the continent of Africa and in the world...

The sessions were fruitful and charted the path to intellectual discussions over the state of international law in Africa and potential reform. the for development and a jurisprudence that is conscious of Pan-Africanism. This session marked the Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education's efforts to provide students with an intellectually rigorous and versatile legal.

Mental Health Seminar Held by the Disability Rights Clinic

On 2nd May 2025, the UNIMA Disability Rights Clinic under the Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education held a Mental Health Seminar in the Law Boardroom. The theme of the seminar was "Embracing Mental Health Change In Legislation In Malawi." The seminar brought together students, staff members, mental health advocates, disability rights experts, and persons with lived experiences. The seminar was opened by the Executive

Director of Malawi Council for Disability Affairs (MACODA), Mr. George Chausiwa, who gave commentary of the passage ofthe Mental Health Bill, calling it a milestone since the draconian 1945 Mental Treatment Act. He however expressed dismay with some of the provisions that undermined the rights of persons with mental health conditions.

The substantive presentation that followed was titled "Towards a Human Rights Based Approach

Mental Health Care in Malawi: An Evaluation of the 2025 Mental Health Bill" and was made by 3rd year law student Jean Allih and 2nd year law student Albert Kuthemba-Mwale. The presentation focused on the evolution of the legal framework for mental health services in Malawi from the colonial period to the newly assented to Mental Health Act 2025. The presenters analysed opportunities and challenges that the act presents,

The keynote address and a testimonial were made by Ms Memory Bismarck, and Mr Simon Thom, who serve as Executive Director and Council Chair Executive of Mental Health Users and Carers Association of Malawi (MeCUHA), respectively. Their presentations highlighted the

importance of humanising persons with mental health conditions, emphasising their inherent dignity and capacity for independent decision making.

The consensus reached was that the now Mental Health Act 2025 is non-compliant

with international human rights instruments, including the African Disability Protocol which Malawi recently ratified in December 2024.

These gaps led to a further consultative meeting between the Clinic Leadership, FEDOMA and MeCUHA. A position paper has since been submitted to the government seeking a possible amendment to the law in order to meet the contemporary human rights approach to mental health service delivery.

Data Analysis Seminar: Strengthening Research Through Feedback



From 8th to 11th April 2025, the Public Law and Clinical Legal Education unit hosted a data seminar for the analysis Women's, Children's, and Nature's Rights in Environmental Governance (WCNREG) master's programme under the School of Law, Economics and Government (SLEG). The seminar took place in the Law buildings boardroom.

WCNREG is a regional online master's programme jointly offered by the University of Oslo, the University of Nairobi, the University of Zimbabwe, and the University of Malawi. The programme is hosted by the University of Nairobi and forms part of a research project funded by the Norwegian Agency for

Development Cooperation (NORAD) through its NORHED II programme. Malawi currently has 12 students enrolled in the programme, all of whom attended the seminar, supported by NORHED.

The event was also graced by **Professor** Happy Kayuni, Professor Julie Stewart from the University of Zimbabwe and Mr. Dennis Chipao, Commissioner of Research and Planning, who shared his expertise in the grounded theory approach, an approach encouraged in the study of women's, children's, nature's rights in environmental governance. It was a week packed with learning and academic vigorous, insightful discussions, focusing on

conceptual clarity, data ensuring interpretation, and alignment between research questions and evidence. seminar came at a crucial time for many students approaching critical phases of their thesis development. As shared participants, the constructive feedback helped them identify gaps in their research and explore strategies to address them. The enriching week concluded with a dinner at Ku Chawe, offering opportunity everyone unwind and reflect on the impact of the week's engagements. We look forward to more opportunities like this to learn, share, and grow together as a scholarly community.

Seminar on The Law of the Sea and Airspace

On the 5th and 6th of May 2025, the Department of Public Law and Clinical Legal Education held a two-part seminar facilitated by the Honourable Justice Redson Kapindu, a justice in the High Court of Malawi and a visiting Professor of Law at UNIMA, under the theme, "The Law of the Sea and Airspace" in the Law Boardroom. The seminar aimed at bringing was international law governing the airspace and the sea to life for the staff. students and online attendees present. Legal practitioners other and professionals who apply the Law of the Sea and Airspace in the course of their work, attended virtually, whilst Bachelor of Law students and other UNIMA staff members attended in person.

The vibrant sessions created a space for lively discussions over pressing issues surrounding territorial maritime and boundaries, emerging trends in African jurisprudence and the rise of commercial space tourism. Moderated by Justice Kapindu, the students interacted with key principles, treaties instruments governing the law of the sea as well as gained an understanding of maritime zones, sovereignty at sea jurisdictional issues. They were introduced also to dispute resolution mechanisms including the role of bodies such as the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea (ITLOS) and its role in dispute settlement. The second half of the seminar was centred on the issue of commercial space

tourism. Students and other participants explored the legal uncertainty of space tourism without clear governing legal frameworks or instruments. The session further examined the potential for the commercialisation of space and the possibility of equitable access to it for African states.

Overall, the afternoons equipped the students with international law knowledge necessary for the fulfilment of their coursework whilst also breaking ground in the academic discourse over airspace law and commercial space tourism. The seminar proved to be a success for the department and exemplified its competence-based approach to learning and legal education.

Everything You Need to Know About International Arbitration: Public Lecture by an International Arbitration Expert Hendrik Puschmann

On 24th March 2025, the Department of Private Law hosted a public lecturer by Hendrik Puschmann in the

Law Boardroom. Puschmann is a Partner and Head of the International Arbitration Group at the Trowers & Hamlins LLP, an international law firm in London. Puschmann's presentation was titled 'Everything You Need to Arbitration in just One Hour.'

His presentation touched on the parties to arbitration, characteristics of the arbitration and how it differs from litigation and the process. He infused humour into the presentation while managing to concisely and efficiently what tackle is otherwise regarded as a complex topic. Needless say, future arbitration experts in the Law School took home more than enough knowledge, motivation and inspiration.

The Department will continue to create moments like this as we continue to honour our commitment to train world-class legal professionals.




Hope Chavula. editor, delivered an overview of the publication, shedding light on its key themes and contributions to the field of economics.


Fertilizer Price Shocks in Sub-Saharan Africa (SSA)


Dr Bridget Kauma donates textbooks to the DoE

This presentation drew on Afrobarometer survey data to highlight the views and perceptions of African citizens on the role of major global powers in their countries. Among the key

highlights of his presentation, Dulani, pointed out that among 8 countries/international bodies that citizens from 30 African countries were asked to rate in 2024 and 2025, China was ranked as the most influential actor, with an aggregate of 60% of African citizens saying China has a positive influence on their country.

Among the countries holding the most positive view of China in Africa include Cabo Verde (88%), followed by Cote D'Ivoire (81%), Liberia (79%) and Sao Tome and Principe (79%). Although only 41%

of Malawians consider China's influence to be positive, nearly as many (39%) say that they do not know enough to say whether China's influence is positive or negative.

In addition to the presentations and debates, the delegates to the Kunming Summit were also taken that several field visits highlighted Chinese development transformation, with particular focus on poverty alleviation, Chinese modernization and the building of community for Chinese nation.

Reflecting on 60 Years of Malawi's Political Culture: Maureen Kapanga Share Groundbreaking Insights

On 4 June 2025. Maureen Kapanga and Professor Happy Kayuni presented a co-authored paper titled "Sixty Years Continuity and Change Malawi's Political Culture: Historical Institutional Analysis (1964-2024)" during the Malawi at 60 Governance Webinar Series Scotlandorganised by the Malawi Partnership.

This enlightening webinar series is a precursor to the publication of authoritative. interdisciplinary volume that marks six decades of Malawi's independence. The book, Malawi Sixty: Political and \boldsymbol{A} Economic Analysis, is edited Gift Wasambo Kayira, Kenneth R. Ross, and Hermann Yokoniah-Mvula. Kapanga and Kayuni's paper will be included as a key chapter in this volume.

The broader aim of the book and the webinar series is to offer a critical, well-rounded account of Malawi's progress and setbacks since independence. Topics include national identity, constitutional development, governance, political evolution, economic transformation, public

finance, the judiciary, civil society, cultural change, regional and ethnic identities, natural resource governance,

development ethics, religion, language, and the arts.

Kapanga Kayuni's and contribution uses a historical institutionalist lens to examine how elements of political culture, particularly patronage clientelism, have remained central to Malawi's governance system. Their analysis traces these features from colonial administration, through the oneparty era to the democratic transition of 1994. The paper argues that political loyalty in exchange for access to state resources has remained dominant feature of Malawi's political landscape, albeit adapted different governing suit contexts over time.

Their findings add an important voice to ongoing conversations about the roots of Malawi's governance challenges and the prospects for reform in the years ahead.


entrepreneurship programmes at their institutions.




