It is a great honour and privilege to stand before you on this momentous occasion as we celebrate the academic achievements of our graduating class. Today marks the culmination of years of hard work, discipline, and resilience. This ceremony, is one of the four ceremonies that we started yesterday until this afternoon.

In total, we have **2643**. graduands who are receiving their certificates. Out of these, **8** graduands are graduating with PhDs, 218 with Masters degrees, 12 with Postgraduate diplomas, 329 with Bachelors degrees (Honours), 1998 with Bachelors degrees 53 with Diplomas and **25** with certificates. **1260** of the graduands are female and 1383 are male (approximately 48% female). We are making steady progress in closing the gender disparity. This graduation recorded 26 distinctions (14 females and **12** males). In this congregation we have 865 graduands.

As we celebrate the remarkable achievements of our graduating

students today, I would like to take this moment and join the Chairman of Council in sincerely thanking all those who have walked with them on this journey.

Honourable Minister, we are deeply grateful to the Government for the continued support to the University and to the education sector at large. Your commitment to higher education remains a cornerstone of national development.

To the parents, guardians, and spouses — thank you for your unwavering sacrifices, encouragement, and patience. Your belief in these graduates has carried them through the most challenging of times.

To the boyfriends and girlfriends — yes, we acknowledge you too! Thank you for the emotional support, the long

chats during study breaks, and for being there in ways that often go unnoticed.

To our dedicated lecturers and staff — your hard work, mentorship, and guidance have helped shape these graduates into the professionals they are becoming. We do not take your commitment for granted.

And to everyone who has played a part — whether big or small — thank you. Today's success is not just that of the graduates, but of a whole community that believed, supported, and invested in them.

To our graduating students—this is your day. You are the heartbeat of the future. You represent hope and the promise of progress. We know many of you belong to Generation Z—curious, connected, creative, and deeply conscious of your values. As

you step out into the world, I urge you to carry with you not only your degrees but also the values of service, excellence, and integrity.

Be bold, but be ethical. Be confident, but stay grounded. And remember, success is not only about what you gain, but what you give back.

The degrees you receive today are not just certificates — they are launchpads for global impact."

"You studied through disruptions such as Covid 19, cyclone Freddy (Feb to March 2023), Cyclone Chido (Dec 2024), Cyclone Jude (last month, March 2025) and you are graduating in uncertainty — that makes you not just qualified, but unstoppable.
